Object of the Society

The object of the Society is the advancement of research, scholarship, and public education in particular by the promotion of study of the cultural history of the eighteenth century.

Principal activities

In furtherance of its objectives the Society engaged in the following main activities during the year:

- 1 Produced further volumes of its journal;
- 2 Held a conference at St Hugh's College, Oxford in January 2013;
- 3 Held a postgraduate and early-career scholars conference at the University Of Northumbria in July 2013;
- 4 Held full committee meetings and arranged for the 2014 conferences at Oxford and Venice.

The executive committee has had regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit when considering its objectives.

Review of activities and financial position

The executive committee was pleased with the activities arranged and managed by the Society during the year which, in addition to our principal activities, included preparations to bid to host the 2019 International Congress on the Enlightenment and an expanded set of free, open-access online reviews, relaunched as 'BSECS Criticks'. In this financial year, the Society gave awards and prizes to the value of £4,250, a 39% increase on the previous year. The publishers of the journal, Wiley-Blackwell, receive all subscriptions and pay the society a lump sum for each issue of the journal and share of any future profits, an arrangement which is now well-established and successful.

The movement in funds for the year is set out in the statement of financial activities on page 5.

The Society's unrestricted reserves at 30 November 2013 amounted to £80,512 and restricted reserves were £12,124 making total reserves of £92,636.
